Year 11 Leavers from Test Valley School





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Introduction

This booklet has been compiled by the Youth Analysis Service (YAS) for Hampshire schools and academies (referred to as establishments), and its data has been compiled from Hampshire's Client Caseload Information System (CCIS).

The booklet is based on the cohort of young people who were recorded as being academically aged Year 11 and in a Hampshire establishment on 31st May 2022, and information presented is a snapshot of that cohort as of 1st November 2022.

Topics covered are based on performance measures used by the Department for Education (DfE), and enable establishments to monitor their current performance, to plan future strategies and to identify potential issues before they arise.

Due to Raising the Participation Age (RPA) legislation 2014, young people are under a duty to participate in education or training until at least their 18th birthday, although in practice most young people continue until the end of the academic year in which they turn 18 (academic Year 13). This significant piece of education legislation has particular importance to vulnerable young people. Primary responsibility for providing independent and impartial careers guidance on participation options rests with establishments directly.

Note that information is withheld and replaced with '-' where less than 5 leavers are recorded.

- * Working with the Hampshire Futures Employment and Skills Hub to deliver Work Experience Health and Safety checks and securing employers to attend employer led sessions and school careers events.
- * Support for parents/carers to understand the resources and range of options available, by attending Parents' Evenings and events and responding to individual enquiries.

In addition, we have provided you with the newly developed Hampshire Futures Careers and Participation Guide to support your careers programme and enhance our working relationships.

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Glossary of Terms

Common Terms

DfE - Department for Education.

Situation - The activity of a young person.

EET - In Education, Employment or Training.

EOTAS - Education Other Than At School (including Home Education).

NEET - Not in Education, Employment or Training.

RPA - Raising the Participation Age. (https://www.gov.uk/government/policies/increasing-opportunities-for-young-people-and-helping-them-to-achieve-their-potential/supporting-pages/raising-the-participation-age).

Unknown - Young people whose destination cannot be confirmed.

Situation Category (see Appendix for detailed breakdown)

RPA: Sixth Form College/School - Includes Sixth Form College and School Sixth Form.

RPA: FE College - Further Education.

RPA: Other Ed inc. Traineeship - Includes Year 11, Higher Education, moved out of area to education, Gap Year students, independent specialist providers, custodial sentences and traineeships.

RPA: Non-Emp Training (FT) - Includes full-time provider-based foundation learning and supported

RPA: Emp (FT) inc. Apprenticeship - Includes full-time jobs with training (nb employed and self-employed) and apprenticeships.

Non RPA: EET (no RPA) inc. PT Emp - Includes full-time jobs without training, part-time education/employment/ training and re-engagement opportunities.

Non RPA: NEET - Available - Unemployed but potentially available for work.

Non RPA: NEET - Not Available - Unemployed and unavailable for work, e.g. young carers.

Other: Includes unknowns, moved out of area to unknown activity, pregnancies, teenage parents, illness and unpaid personal development opportunities that support young people to enter EET.

Education Programmes

Level 3 - A Levels - GCE A Levels.

Level 3 - Technical - Includes all vocational programmes including BTEC, CTEC, NVQ, T Levels etc.

Level 2 - Technical - Includes all vocational programmes including BTEC, CTEC, NVQ etc.

Level 2 - GCSEs - GCSEs.

Level 1 - Technical - Includes all vocational programmes including BTEC, CTEC, NVQ etc.

Entry Level inc. Traineeships - Entry level programmes including Traineeships.

Other Education Course - Includes higher education courses and programme types not specified in the data sent by further education establishments.

Due to rounding of multiple numbers the figures in some tables may not always add up to 100%.



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


Situation Overview

The chart below shows that 94.4% of Test Valley School Year 11s in 2022 moved to participating situations that meet the DfE defined 'Raising the Participation Age (RPA)'. Of the remaining 5.6%, 4.5% moved to Non RPA situations and 1.1% to Other situations. The 'Other' category includes young people who are working towards participation, on a temporary break, unable to engage due to personal reasons as well as those whose situation is unknown or who have moved out of the area.



The same chart showing the total Hampshire cohort indicates that 93.5% of Hampshire Year 11 leavers moved to RPA situations in 2022. The RPA percentage for Test Valley School is higher than that for Hampshire.




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Raising the Participation Age (RPA) Situations

The graph below shows the percentage of leavers from Test Valley School who moved to a RPA situation in Year 12. It shows percentages for the past five years, and compares these to the Hampshire percentages over the same time period.



The tables below show the actual numbers of young people in a RPA situation compared to the numbers in the cohort. Where fewer than five people are recorded the information is withheld and replaced with '-'.



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RPA Situation Breakdown

RPA situations are grouped into five categories, seen below. The Situation Category table in the glossary on page 5 defines each category. The graph below shows that there is a larger percentage of Test Valley School leavers moving to an education programme ('Sixth Form College/School', 'FE College', 'Other Ed inc. Traineeship') than the Hampshire average, but a smaller percentage moving to a training situation.



The tables below show the actual numbers of young people in each RPA situation. Where fewer than five people are recorded the information is withheld and replaced with '-'.



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RPA Education Programme

There are different types of education programmes. The bar chart below shows that a smaller percentage of education programme leavers from Test Valley School moved on to study a Level 3 programme than the Hampshire average. A lower percentage moved to Technical programmes than the Hampshire average.



The table below shows the actual numbers of young people in each programme type. Where fewer than five people are recorded the information is withheld and replaced with '-'.

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RPA Programme Establishments

Certain factors can greatly influence the appeal of a post-16 education establishment, such as the type of courses offered.

The table below shows the most popular establishments attended, as of 1st November 2022, by the Year 11 leavers from Test Valley School who moved to a full-time education programme. It shows the number of young people attending the establishment, and the percentage they represent compared to all Test Valley School full-time education leavers (81).

The figures include young people repeating a year of statutory education. Establishments with fewer than five people attending are not shown.


Year 11 leavers from Test Valley School moving to an education programme also attended Queen Mary's College, and Wiltshire College and University Centre.



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Other Situation

The graph below shows the percentage of Year 11 leavers from Test Valley School who moved to a situation that is categorised as neither RPA nor Non RPA. It compares Test Valley School percentages to those of Hampshire.



The situation category 'Other' is not broken down due to the small numbers of young people involved. The 'Other' category includes young people who are taking part in unpaid personal development opportunities that support them to enter EET, pregnancies, teenage parents, those whose illness prevents them from participating, unknowns, and young people moved out of area to an unknown activity.

The tables below show the actual numbers of young people in a situation categorised as 'Other' compared to the numbers in the cohort. Where fewer than five people are recorded the information is withheld and replaced with '-'.

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Intended Destination


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


September Guarantee

The graphs below examine the Year 12 situation, grouped by RPA, Non RPA and Other, of leavers who had a positive September Guarantee, and those who had a negative or no September Guarantee.

The dark lines in the Postive September Guarantee graph indicates the percentage of leavers whose September Guarantee was realised.





Of the Year 11 leavers from Test Valley School who had a positive September Guarantee, 94.4% are now in a destination that meets the RPA requirements.

The table below shows the number of leavers who had a positive or negative/not recorded September Guarantee, and their Year 12 situation category. Where fewer than five people are recorded the information is withheld and replaced with '-'.
